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# 1 Introduction

SoilNet CPA (**C**ontrol **P**anel **A**pplication) is a software to receive, decode, answer, visualize and export the data packets from the wireless sensor network SoilNet V5.

The SoilNet soil moisture network supports both LoRa (Long Range) and the NB-IoT (Narrowband Internet of Things) Low Power Wide Area Network (LPWAN) radio technology standards. In both versions, the data output to and from the CPA is transmitted via a VPN tunnel. Depending on the LPWAN version (NB-IoT or LoRa), this is done using different protocols (UDP protocol for NB-IoT and MQTT protocol for LoRa)

The CPA uses configuration files to specify how the network data is processed and to describe the incoming and outgoing data. Furthermore, the operation parameters such as the measuring interval can be specified. The time synchronization of the measuring units is carried out using a time stamp in the return package (CPA -> sensor unit).

Furthermore, different measuring units can be defined (e.g. soil moisture station, weather station, groundwater level station, etc.), which can be operated in parallel.

For each sensor unit there is a separate tabular representation of the data on a website. Here, the most recently received data can be viewed and the proper operation of the sensors can be checked.

The SoilNet CPA application is running on a Linux based system, e.g. Ubuntu or Raspberry Pi OS.

# 2 Installation

## 2.1 Hardware requirement

## 2.2 Software requirements

- Ubuntu 18.04 or higher
- OpenVPN client software
- soilnetcpa\_0.3.11\_amd64.deb or soilnetloracpa\_0.3.11\_arm.deb
- nginx

# 2.3 Step by Step

## Install software

- \$ sudo apt install openvpn nginx unattended-upgrades Copy the current version and install it:

#### Set up OpenVPN

# 3.1 Datapath NB-IoT



Figure 1: Data path of the SoilNet NB-IoT version

The SoilNet sensor units are connected to a private NB-IoT network operated by a cellular network provider and can be accessed via the Internet Protocol (IP).

For security reasons, the IP network is not directly connected to the Internet. The sensor units therefore do not use public IP addresses for the connection, but only the private addresses from the address spaces defined in (RMK + 96) or (WKD + 12).

The open source software "OpenVPN" is used for this access.

The SoilNet CPA receives and sends IP packets to the sensor boxes via this VPN tunnel and the provider network.

The sensor units transmit the data packets to the "SoilNetCPA" software using the UDP protocol (NB-IoT).

The software can assign the sensor units based on the IP address.

An advantage of this approach is the lower implementation effort in the sensor units and a lower transmission rate of the data, since there is no need to transmit any further data for identification.

## 3.2 Datapath LoRa



Figure 2: Data path of the SoilNet LoRa version

The sensor units are connected to the LoRa-WAN network via a base station that consists of a LoRa modem (concentrator) and a Linux system (Raspberry Pi).

The "Packet Forwarder" service runs on this computer and transfers incoming packets from the Concentrator to the LoRaWAN stack via UDP.

A software component called "LoRa Gateway Bridge" converted a UDP packet into an MQTT packet for the "Packet Forwarder".

The LoRa stack now processes the data packets further. After decryption, the LoRa App Server sends the packet to the SoilNetCPA using MQTT.

Communication in the other direction is analogous. However, there is a difference that the LoRa Network Server temporarily stores messages for the sensor boxes.

The reason for this is the restriction that the data can only be received from the sensor unit in certain time windows (always a few seconds after they have sent a message).

In a LoRaWAN network, identification is based on the DeviceEUI in the LoRaWAN header.



Figure 3: Internal program sequence

1. The LoRaWan / NB-IoT handler takes over the data package via MQTT (LoRa) / UDP (NB-IoT) from the network.

2. The LoRaWAN / NB-IoT handler sends a response packet to the sensor unit to confirm receipt of the data, set measurement parameters and set the time of the sensor unit for synchronization. The measurements are stored in a FIFO buffer on the sensor units and

are only deleted from this buffer after the confirmation has been received. If the sensor unit has not received a confirmation, it tries to send the same packet again the next time. A complete time series is thus possible.

3. The LoRaWAN / NB-IoT handler decodes the received data packet and forwards it to the data packet handler. The LoRaWAN / NB-IoT handler uses the XML-based import configuration (see section 3.3.1) which specifies the format of the data packet.

4. The data packet handler now forwards the packet to the output unit for data export (.csv). Here the XML-based export configuration serves as a format descriptor (see section 3.3.4).

5. A web socket connection is used to view the most recently received data via a web browser. Another XML-based configuration file describes the output on the website in tabular form (see section 3.3.3).

# 4 Configuration files

There are different configuration files (format .xml) to determine how the software works:

## 4.1 Import config file

The import config file describes the format of the incoming data packets. Here it is specified at which position a measured value is located and in which format it is available (decimal, float, timestamp, etc.)

## 4.2 Node config file

The node configuration file contains information specific to the sensor unit. The name of the unit and the measuring interval are specified here. There is also the option of entering metadata for the table display in the web browser.

## 4.3 View config files

The view config files describe the format of the table display in the web browser (e.g. definition of the columns and rows).

## 4.4 Export config file

The exported format is described in one or more export configuration files. Here you can specify at which position which value in which format is written in an output file. The delimiter is also declared.

## 4.5 Nbiot config file

The assignment of the incoming data stream to the respective application (type of device) is specified in this XML file.

The following has to be indicated:

- 1. Name of the device
- 2. Type of device (application ID)
- 3. IP address of the device

# 5 Web Live Status

The CPA software creates a tabular view of the last measured values on a web interface.

After called up the user interface (host ip address, port 80), there is first an overview of the "Views" available (assignment to AppEUI).

The table shows an overview of the sensor units. The entry age in seconds can be seen in the first line.

Depending on the configuration, the unit parameters and the sensor values are displayed here.

A grouping of the sensor values is possible and always makes sense if there are several measured variables from one sensor.

Coloured highlighting when a limit value is exceeded or not reached is also possible, this makes it easier to find abnormalities.
